2018 - 2019 Measles Outbreak in Rockland County:

“As of February 13, 2019, there are 135 confirmed reported cases of measles in Rockland County.”

“Vaccination rates for confirmed measles cases:

- 81.5% have had 0 MMRs
- 3.1% have had 1 MMR
- 4.6% have had 2 MMRs
- 10.8% unknown status”

“The Monroe County Department of Public Health (MCDPH) has confirmed a total of 4 lab confirmed cases of measles in Monroe County and 3 cases that while not lab confirmed fit the clinical profile of measles - bringing to total number of cases to 7. Measles is a highly contagious respiratory disease caused by a virus that is spread by direct contact with nasal or throat secretions of infected people.”

“Recent Infections in Brooklyn

As of February 12, 2019, there have been 73 confirmed cases of measles in the Orthodox Jewish community in Brooklyn since October. The initial child with measles was unvaccinated and acquired measles on a visit to Israel, where a large outbreak of the disease is occurring. Since then, there have been additional children from Brooklyn who were unvaccinated and acquired measles while in Israel. Children who did not travel were also infected in Brooklyn or Rockland County.”

“The neighborhoods that are affected include:

- Bensonhurst: 1 confirmed measles case (no new cases since November 2018)
- Borough Park: 39 confirmed measles cases (1 new case in the past week)
- Midwood/Marine Park: 1 confirmed measles case (no new cases since November 2018)
- Williamsburg: 32 confirmed measles cases (5 new case in the past week)”

“UPDATED: Feb. 7, 2019, 10:45 am

Measles has been confirmed in three more Multnomah County residents, bringing the total number of cases in Oregon to 4. Officials say the three individuals stayed home and pose no risk of new public exposures. The individuals were in close contact with a Multnomah County resident who tested positive for measles on January 25. These cases are linked to an outbreak in Washington state.”
